A Letter from Aunt Fannie.

Copied

from a letter written to a member of John Fox Sherry's family by his sister Frances Sherry Browning.

Grandma Sherry's maiden name was Mary Ann Alner and her mother's maiden name was Repentance Davidge. Her mother had two sisters named Love and Virtue. They were a family of intense piety, as you will perceive by their names. I remember Grandma Alner, that she dressed very plainly and neat and wore a quaint kind of Quaker bonnet the fashion of which she never changed, and would have considered it wicked to have a flower or even a bow or ribbon on it.

Grandfather Alner's name was John and he had one brother named Abner, and two sisters, Elizabeth and Dorothea, who was called Dolly. They said she was very pretty and loved pretty things, and was fond of riding horseback.

At that time the Alners owned farms called The Shettles Estate and lived near Shaftesbury. Your Grandpa Sherry's Father and Mother were not Shaftesbury people but came from Weymouth to Shaftesbury. Your Grandpa was born at Weymouth, a Seaport of Dorset. He had one sister, her name was Frances. We called her Aunt Fanny. Your Grandpa Sherry's Father was one of a family of five brothers some of whom live at Corne. If you have an encyclopedia Britanica, and look up those two places you will find they are both Ancient places in Dorset, Eng. One of the brothers, James, lived at Pusey near Salisbury, Wiltshire. I will enclose a copy of the old record taken from the original in your Great, Great Grandfather's Bible. This grandfather spent his last years at Pusey with his son, and he died and was buried at Pusey. This son, James, owned flour mills and grew quite rich. He was the Uncle that left to my Father and his sister Fanny the legacy of about \$8,000. Their father having died it came to them. And each of the other brothers if living or to their family he left the same amount. Also to all the Brothers and Sisters or to their family, on his wife's side to each the same amount \$8,000. But the most of his money went to charitable institutions. He had no children. I was invited to visit them and spent a week or more at his home when I was a girl about 15 yrs. old. It was such a pretty place with beautiful lawns and shrubbery. Their house was called Uphaven Cottage. If I ever went to England that is the place of all others I should want to revisit. Of course the place is changed, probably it could hardly be located now as everything was sold at the death. But the old Episcopal Church, no doubt, still stands and there is the Old Churchyard where his father and mother and he and his wife are buried. At the time I was in Pusey, he was retired from business, and drove out a great deal. He was known all around there and by everybody in Pusey. He was very fond of and very kind to his horse. I heard it told of to my father that when he was on his death-bed he ordered his horse brought around to where he could see him. We none of us know whether Aunt Fanny ever had her money or if it is in the Bank all these years, some 40 years. Aunt Fanny married a man named Davidge, though no relation to Grandmother Alner. She, her husband and children went to Australia, all but eldest daughter married and lived at Kent near London. She afterwards sailed for Australia, but the vessel was wrecked and all were lost.

"Marion kept track of all the family records - kept the Family Bible up to date. She used to say that our Grandfather Chandler was a descendant of Myles Standish."

"The Chandlers came from Chebeague. Mother always said that Chandlers Cove on Great Chebeague Island was named for her family."

"Father loved to sail, loved the water. Used to take me with him on the boats out of Portland to the islands in the bay."

"I was named for my Aunt Lida Bisbee. (Eliza A. Chandler) When her husband died she came back from Cincinnati to stay with her parents. Later she lived with Aunt Sarah Dyer."

"Blanche Lovell's mother was a sister of Father." (Jenny)

"Father had a brother James in the plumbing business in England who had a son Fred and a daughter Amy. Amy married William Smith and lived at Shaftesbury and Southsea. Fred and Amy visited us in Portland. Fred carried a walking stick - quite a "dude"!"

"Walter Leach was a grandson of Aunt Sarah Dyer. He had a lot of information about the ancestry of the Chandlers but his papers were lost when his home was burned."

"Aunt Fanny was a sister of Father. She had one son John Sherry Browning. Aunt Fanny spent her last years at Mt. Auburn Home For The Aged. She wore a lace cap fixed just so. You would have thought she was Queen Victoria. She had her stationery printed "360 Mount Auburn Street". Very proud."

"When Grandfather Sherry died little Mabel jumped up on his bed and said "Wake up Grandpa". "

"Grace Graves was a daughter of Aunt Nell." (Ellen L. Chandler)

"Father's brother Will Sherry ran a fresco business in Boston. He had a daughter Grace who married John Avery. Uncle Will may have a grandson living now named James Tobey."

"A Tucker married a grandchild of Will Sherry."

"Charles Sherry worked for Father, then he went into business for himself. He was a brother of Father. His children were Viola, Bert, Alice, Philip and Helen."

"Aunt Sarah Dyer had a son William and a daughter Nella Dyer Leach. Sarah's granddaughter Hazel Tower had a summer home on Peakes Island. Lives there year 'round now."

"When Grandmother Sherry died I remember being taken to stay with Aunt Sarah Dyer."

"Father and Mother often used to entertain sea captains from England. We always had roast beef for Sunday dinner."

"If Mother were sick you'd never know it."

REMINISCENCES of LIDA BISBEE SHERRY

"Mother had so much patience."

"Father used to get up very early - he took a cold bath every morning and made me get up to practice my violin before breakfast."

"I miss the large family. We were always such a close family. Marion listed those who had Christmas Dinner at the Carlton's in 1938 - Charles, Georgie and Edith Carlton, Gene, Marion and Lida, Nelle, Lawrence, Wilbur and his family, Frank, Emma, Howard, Phyllis and her family, Arthur and Ruth and Grace Lovell a cousin from Portsmouth."

"When Edith and Ralph Rowe were first married they had rooms in Nelle's three story house on Congress St. Eleanor was born there. Charles Leighton had his medical office downstairs."

"When Mabel married Ralph White in 1906, the wedding was held at Nelle's home on Congress Street in Portland. Gene gave the bride away - Grace Graves played the Wedding March - Mill, Georgie, Edith, Marion and I served refreshments."

"Mabel and Emma worked at the photography shop of Lamson in Portland."

"When I was in Boston working at the First National Bank, I lived with Marion and Gene on Harvard Street next door to Nelle and Lawrence. Later we had an apartment on Linnaean Street not far from Georgie."

"Edith's husband Ralph Rowe managed a summer hotel on Chebeague - The Hamilton. He set a nice table, awfully good food."

"Frank and Emma had a pleasant home on Skahan Road in Belmont. I enjoy my visits with Emma there now."

"Arthur met Maud when she was my Classmate in High School. His date didn't show up for a skating party so someone introduced him to Maud and she went with him - from then on. She was a sweet girl."

"Father was fond of music. He loved to have us gather in the parlor after Sunday supper and entertain. Nelle, Georgie or Marion played the piano. Millie sang - she had a lovely voice. Gene, Mabel, Frank and I played the violin. Art had a nice singing voice. Edith had a guitar and Georgie had a mandolin and they had quite a few pieces they could play."

"Frank and Marion worked for Gene in his leather business in Boston."

"When Lawrence Leighton was studying at Oxford Nelle and Marion went to England to see him. They visited Shaftesbury where Father was born."

"Arthur was an auditor for the Maine Central Railroad in Portland and lived on Granite Street."

"Gene was my 'distant relative' - he was twenty-four years older than I."

"Millie and the Farwell girls lived with Georgie and Charles on Agassiz Street after Ellis Farwell died. Millie loved to eat ice cream."

"Father was a member of the Masons and the Odd Fellows. He served as a chaplain in both. He had a lot of dignity. He always attended St. Stephens Episcopal Church."

"We once had what we called 'The Toy Symphony' - Nelle played the piano, Gene first violin and Mabel second violin. I had a whistle and the rattle. There was a triangle and one other instrument. A friend of Papa wrote two pieces for our little symphony."

"We had some good times and you can't take them away!"

"In summer we would go to Higgins Beach by horse and buggy which Father hired from a livery stable. We just loved it there! You should see Higgins Beach now! The cottages are so close together!"

"When Ralph Rowe wanted to marry Edith he went upstairs, where Father was in the sitting room, to ask Father for Edith's hand. On the way down he tripped and fell. He told Edith that Father had kicked him down the stairs!"

"About 1914 we had a big Family Reunion at Nelle's house in Portland. Millie and the girls came on from California and were visiting Nelle. On Christmas day Eleanor led the group marching down from the upstairs sitting room to the Christmas Tree. Eleanor got snowshoes from Uncle Gene and a watch - a real watch that kept time. Phyllis was there and Wilbur and Lawrence all dolled up and on their good behavior."

"In winter Father wore an Astrachan hat."

"At one time we had a black shaggy dog."

"Uncle Will Sherry had three daughters - Fanny married a Freebie and had no children, Grace married John Avery and had a daughter who married a Tucker, Mary married a Tobey and had a son James who worked for Gordon Wyman."

"Clothes were generally made at home. We had a dressmaker who came in by the day. Aunt Nelle Graves did a lot of sewing for us whenever she came. Don't think Mother did much sewing although she did make me a dress once."

"Father's store was originally in Monument Square on the first floor. Later he went into the Baxter Building, one flight up."

"Father was never very handy at making anything - always said he could fix something if he 'only had the right tools'."

"Father would do the marketing in the morning and buy the meat. On Fridays he went down to the wharf to get fresh fish."

"We girls had our picture taken for Father for Christmas 1899. Our dresses were made by a Mrs. McDonough who had a dressmaking shop on Congress Street."

"Art and Frank were both good at cooking. They used to get Sunday dinner occasionally. Gene liked to cook too."

"Our best dresses were often made of foulard."

"Frank could make anything!"

"Lawrence was smart. He got all A ranks at Bowdoin and a Rhodes Scholarship for Oxford."

"When Marian was a baby she was so dainty that everyone called her the Little Rosebud."

"When I was fifteen I'd go to Boston on the train alone and be so scared that no one would meet me. Children are so different now - so capable."

"We had an upstairs sitting room in the house on Elm Street. After supper we would sit around a big round table with a Welsbach gas lamp to do our studying."

"Feet used to be smaller. Marion had real small feet - she wore a size two shoe."

"Mother took me to Boston when I was seven. We went to dinner with Will Sherry's daughter, Grace Avery. She served oysters on the half shell and it's a good thing I had some bread to wash them down."

"Gene left Portland right after high school - went to Boston and made a good living there."

"When we first went to Pocasset we had to sail around Cape Cod. The Cape Canal opened in 1914."

"At Christmas our tree was set up on the grand piano in the parlor. We all came downstairs and had to eat breakfast before we could go to the tree. The year I had diphtheria I got up just in time for Christmas. I was bow-legged and cross-eyed, awfully funny looking but I didn't care. The tree was
BEAUTIFUL !"

"Nelle Graves and Sara Dyer used to come to our house and play bridge with Mother and had such a good time. Those sisters were very close. They would get one of the older girls to fill in for a fourth."

"Art and I used to stand in front of the mirror in the dining room and make faces. Once Mabel and Edith put on sheets and crept down the stairs. We were scared to death. Art ran upstairs. I don't remember what happened to me."

"When I went to California to visit Mill in 1914 I had some new high button boots - patent with cloth uppers - quite the thing then."

"Georgie wore what was called a "rat" in her hair. Marion and I tried to get her to stop using it. One night after Georgie was asleep we got a mouse trap and caught the rat."

Marion, Gene and Frank were there and had to get out through a second story window. Some neighbors picked them up in a rowboat."

"Mr. Curit of Chebeague used to deliver clams to us in Portland."

"Ralph laughed at Mabel because she made of children so much. He said "With all the children in your family I'd think you'd see enough of them"."

"Gene was a good scout, everybody loved him. He said "When you drink bathtub gin you open your mouth and toss it in and don't breathe until after you swallow it"."

"Georgie went to Boston and was secretary for E C Swift of the meat people. She roomed on Hancock Street and I loved to visit her."

"Millie said when she went to California everybody spoke to everybody else without asking who they were - so different from New England."

"Take my advice and if there's anything you want to do and you possibly can -
DO IT."

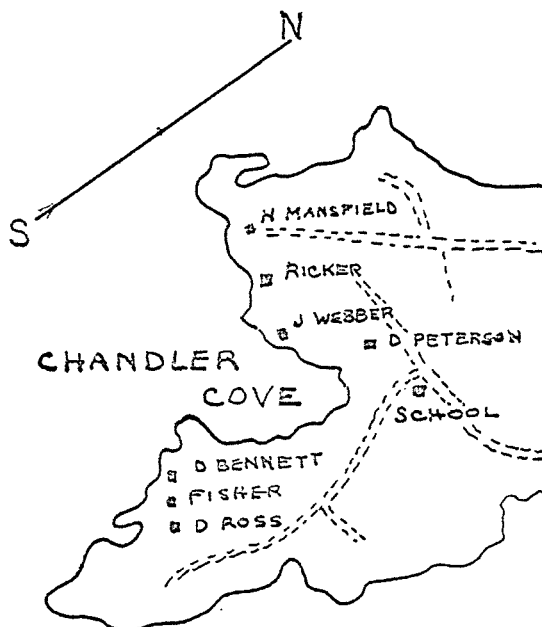

CHEBEAGUE ISLAND

CASCO BAY

MAINE

In 1746 Zachariah Chandler bought the southwest half of Great Chebeague Island. He later sold half of his land to some of his brothers. Jonathan built his home near the shore at what is now called Chandler's Cove. This same property was later owned and occupied by his son David Chandler. Here some early religious meetings were held according to North Yarmouth records. One entry states that six Hamilton children were baptized at a "lecture at the house of David Chandler". Another entry shows that Asa Chandler son of David and Rebecca was baptized Sept. 18, 1799 at a "Lecture at D. Chandler's". After David's death his widow, sons and daughters sold the farm on Apr. 5, 1828 to David Bennett. In 1871 the property was still in possession of the Bennett family as shown by Beer's Atlas of Cumberland County. The location is near the present Chandler Cove Landing of the Casco Bay Ferry.

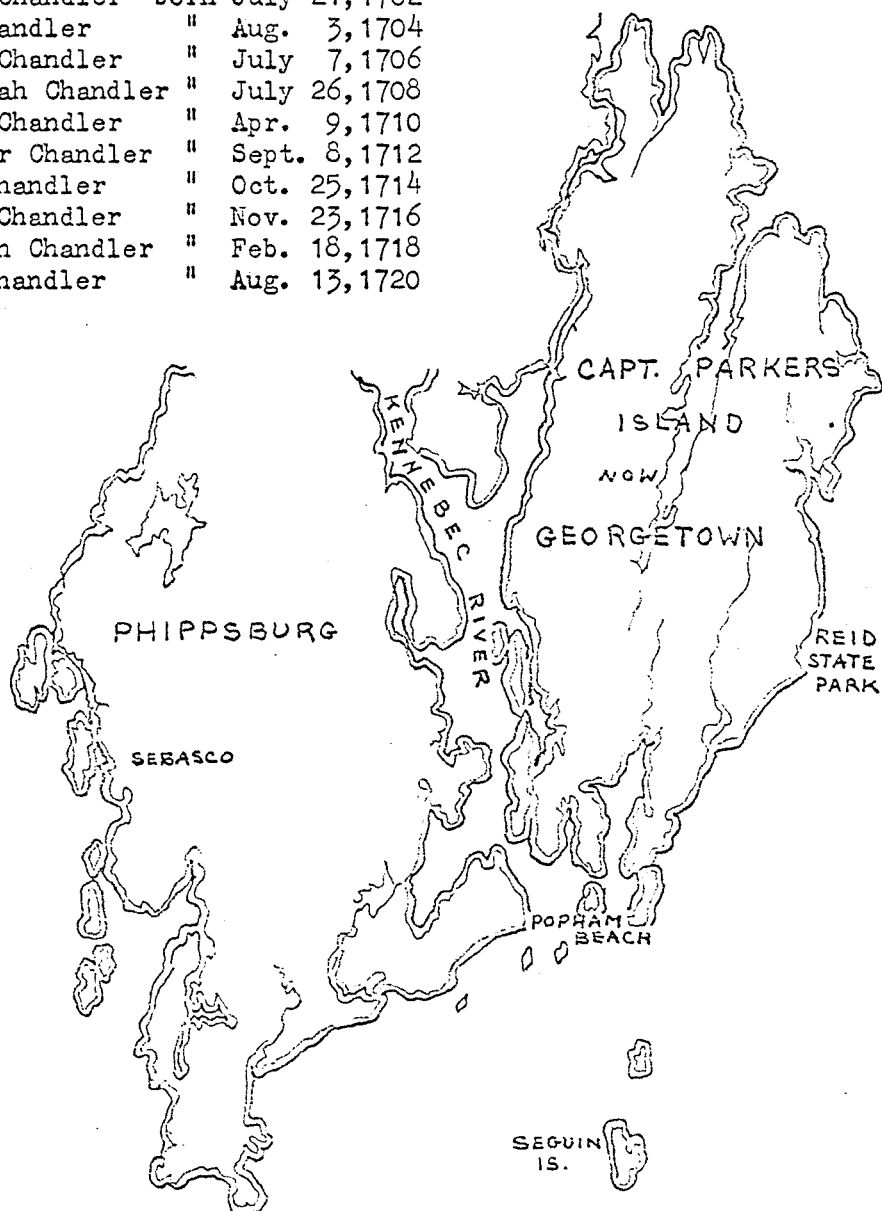

Susanna Pope

Daughter of Thomas Pope and his second wife sarah Jenney. Sarah was the dau. of John Jenney and his wife Sarah Carey of Plymouth. Susanna was killed while fleeing to the fort with her husband.

Jacob Mitchell married 1696

A constable and surveyor in Plymouth. Sold his home there in 1728 and moved to North Yarmouth, Maine. Settled on lot no. 91 on the s.w. side of Royals River just east of Atwells Creek. Died Dec. 21 1744.

Deliverance Kingman

Born 1676 daughter of John Kingman and Elizabeth . Granddaughter of Henry Kingman of Weymouth Mass. In 1696 a son and two daughters of John Kingman married a daughter and two sons of Jacob Mitchell in a famous triple wedding.

Of Pembroke Mass. In 1741 he followed his father to North Yarmouth where he was a blacksmith. He became a selectman, town treasurer and later a deacon. Died 1784 ae 87.

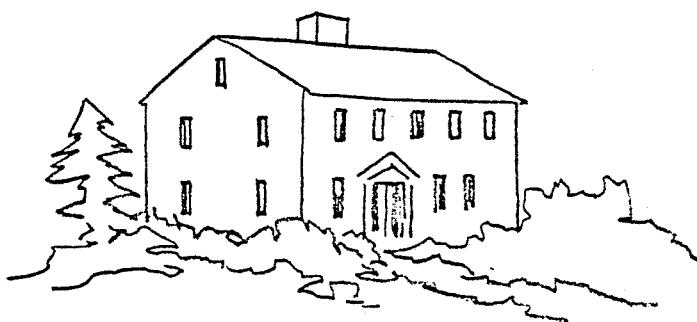

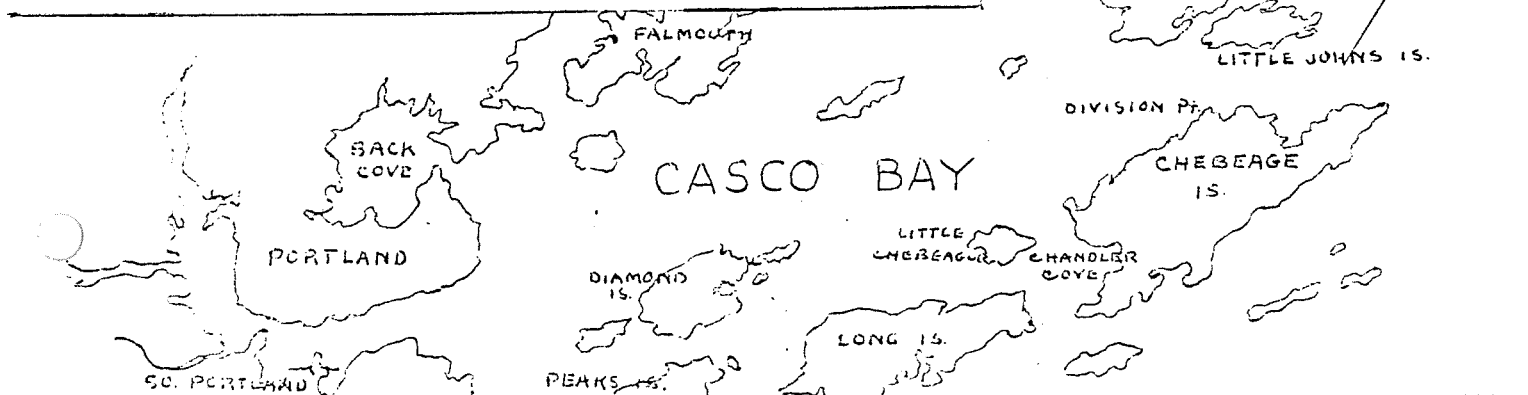

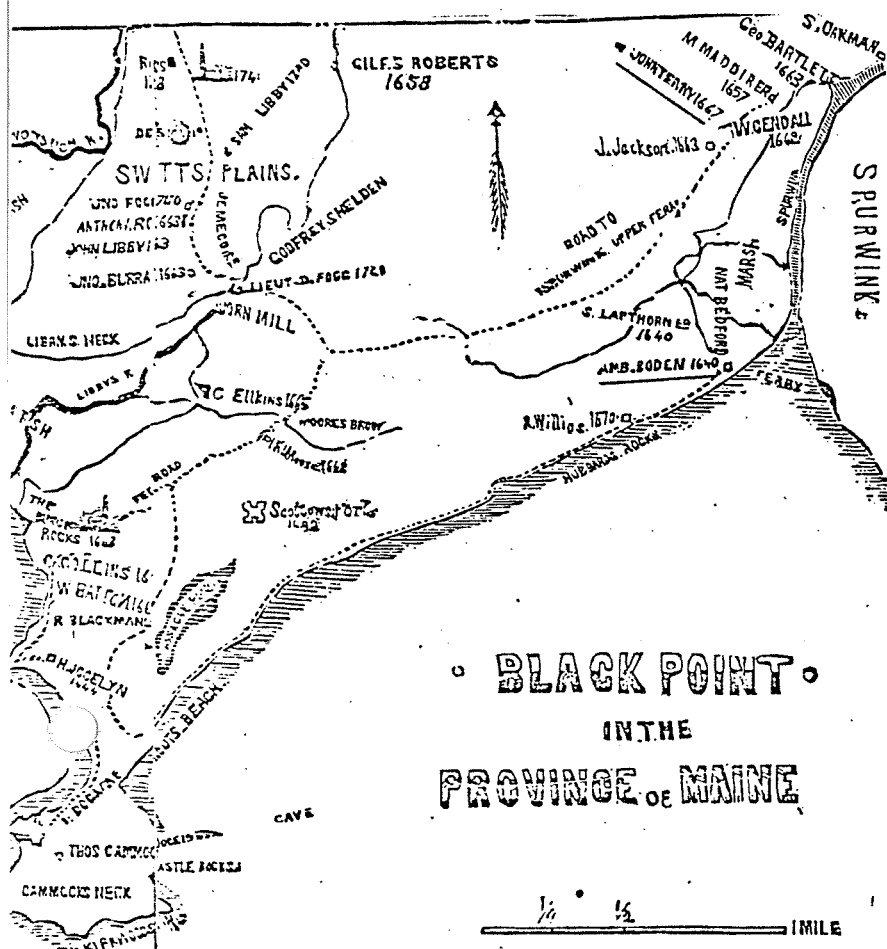
Margaret Warwick

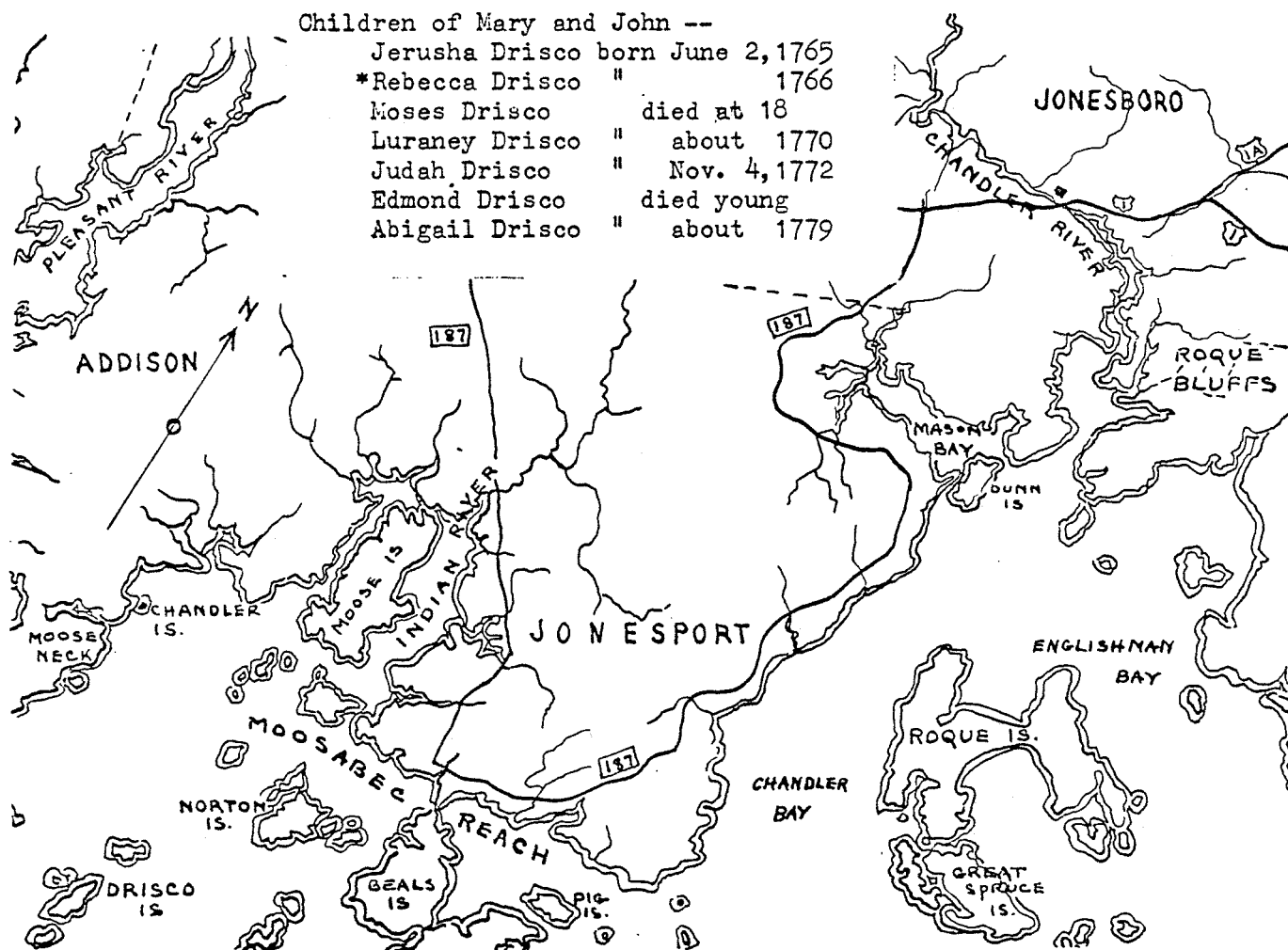

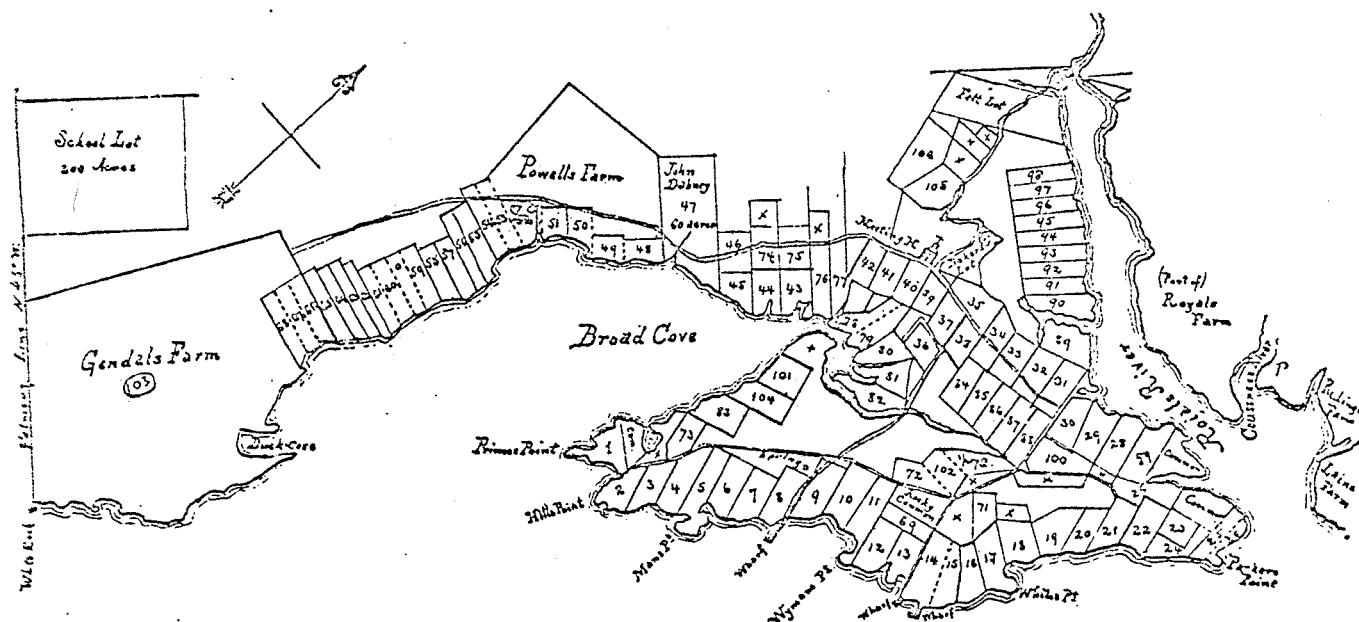

PEDIGREE OF CHUTE OR CHEWTE.

[Communicated by D. DUDLEY of Boston.]

The following is the substance of an ancient tabular pedigree, on parchment, now in the possession of Mr. Ariel P. Chute of Lynnfield, Mass., who inherited it from his ancestors. We do not vouch for the accuracy of its details, though the original manuscript bears evidence of being at least one hundred and fifty years old. Portions of the manuscript are nearly illegible, but they have all been satisfactorily deciphered.

At the sides of the pedigree, the coats of arms of the various families with which this family has intermarried, are impaled with the arms of Chute. These arms we have described in notes at the end of the article.

A. Alexander¹ Chewte [A] of Taunton, in the county of Somers¹, A. D. 1268, had issue: John,² Esq. of the same town m. Jane Bromfield, dau. of Sir John B.; and Richard² of the time of Edward the First, 1274.

John² and Jane had a son Edward,³ Esq. m. Christiana Chiddock, dau. of Sir John C. and had issue, temp. Edward III., 1308: Phillip,⁴ Esq. of Taunton, m. the daughter of Sir John Brittan [I]; James,⁴ m. the daughter of Richard Greenfield; Anthony,⁴ m. Anna Indford [or Indforte], and d. s. p.

Phillip,⁴ Esq. had issue: George,⁵ m. the dau. of Thomas Faril, Esq., about 1344; and Jane,⁵ m. John Cameron, Knight.

George⁵ had Ambrose,⁶ Esq. of Taunton, m. Amabel Chittester, [J] dau. of Sir John C., and had Edward⁷ and Christian.⁷ The former m., about 1379, Dionis, dau. of Henry Sturton [B] [or Stourton]; the latter, Christian,⁷ m. Ralph Mansell, Esq.

Edward⁷ and Dionis had Henry,⁸ 1420, m. the dau. of Edward Hasherfield, Esq.; William,⁸ m. —, and d. s. p.; Anthony,⁸ m. the dau. of Sir John Clifton, and had Christopher⁹ of Hertfordshire, who m. the dau. of Richard Wellgrave, Esq., and Robert,⁹ Sargeant at law, and later, Baron of the Exchequer, lived to the reign of Henry VI.

Henry⁸ had issue: Robert,⁹ Esq. of Taunton, m. Alice, dau. of Mark Bartley Esq.; Anna,⁹ m. John Stanley.

Robert⁹ (1438) had Charles,¹⁰ m. the dau. of Sir John Chang, and, about 1480, had a son, Edmond,¹¹ who sold the manor of Taunton to Lord Donhore, about 1502. His son and heir, Robert,¹² m. Jane Lucas, [D] dau. of John L., and had issue: Oliver,¹³ m. the dau. of Relide; Charles,¹³ m. the daughter of John Crips of the Isle of Guernsey; William,¹³ m. the dau. of John Braddelson of Turbridge.

Charles¹² (1580) had issue: Anthony,¹⁴ m. the dau. of William Gee [E]; and Phillip,¹⁴ m. the dau. of Coolpepper [F], and had George,¹⁵ m. a lady of Kent, Edward¹⁵ and Anthony.¹⁵

Anthony,¹⁴ above named, son of Charles, had issue: Anthony,¹⁵ William,¹⁵ Christopher,¹⁵ and Lionel,¹⁵ m. the dau. of Stephen Greene, and had five children—Lionel,¹⁶ m. the dau. of Robert Baker [G]; George¹⁶; Isaac, m. —; Charles¹⁶; Judith,¹⁶ m. John Edmonson.

Lionel,¹⁶ Jr. had a son James,¹⁷ who came with his father from England, about 1635, and settled at Ipswich, Mass., where he m. the dau. of — Epes, Esq. of that place, and had James,¹⁸ who m. the dau. of — Wood [H], and had issue: 1. Lionel,¹⁹ m. Hannah Cheney; 2. James,¹⁹ m. Mary Thurston; 3. Thomas,¹⁹ m. a dau. of Mr. Clarke of Boston, and had issue; 4. Mary,¹⁹ m. John Cheney of Newbury; 5. Elizabeth,¹⁹ m. Given to Phillip Chewte Capt^{ve} of Cumber Castle and Standard bearer to ye met of Arms at ye Siego of Bolloungge in France by Henry ye Eighth."

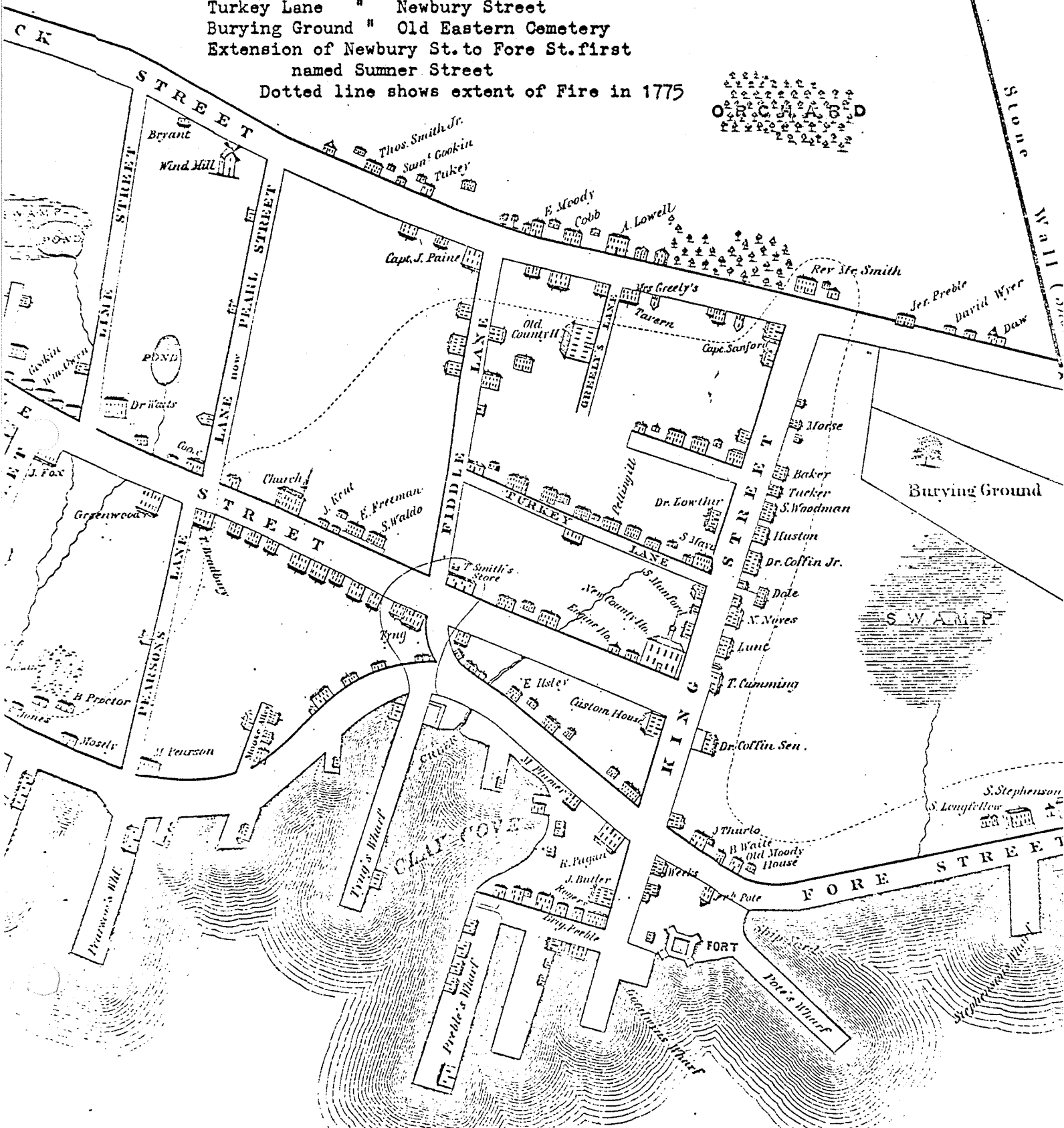

 Born Nov. 13, 1670 in Ipswich and died after 1711. Daughter of John Spark and His wife Mary Roper.
